- Delmae showed an Aechmea recurvata that had flowered and asked "what next?". It was shown as purchased, the mix a mush of black stuff. We suggested she removed the basal leaves, repotted the plant in 3:1 scoria:mix, add some fertilizer and look forward to lovely offsets, that will flower next year.

- * Darryl arrived with a beautiful Neoregelia 'Red Macaw'. These plants are very dependant on good light to attain and maintain a bright yellow colour. They can lose all yellow and become green in just one overcast day.
- * Dave Weston won the flowering section with Billbergia 'Afterglow' with colour bright I doubt anyone took notice of the perfect inflorescence.
- * Dave gave a presentation on Dyckia, Deuterocohnia & Hechtia and provided each attendee with a descriptive handout that included coloured pictures. He had put in a lot of time in the preparation, did an excellent presentation and he even separated offsets without using gloves! Thanks Dave.

Some self pollinators of the Tillandsia World by Bob Hudson

I have been growing tillandsia seed for 30 years. When I started it was very hard to acquire seed but when I became a BSI member in 1978 I started to buy seed from Harvey Beltz who operated the BSI Seed Bank. I found a mixed result; some was not viable and did not germinate, probably due to ageing.

The Queensland Bromeliad Society had tillandsia seed growers and I eventually managed to get some from Greg Stewart. Now I have enough plants to have a good supply of seed but always welcome alternate seed from other growers.

Many species self pollinate and set seed. Should you desire to hybridise with any of these plants you would need to gather their pollen and transfer it to the other plant.

The self pollinators are -

All of the Diaphoranthema group (your Uncle Derek will be talking on these at the WBC in June) plus the following

bulbosa silver butzii adpressifolia balbisiana belloensis *elongata* v. subimbricata gardneri festucoides hammeri limbata *juncea* large form & minor iuncifolia makovama psuedobaileyi schiedeana major &minor paucifolia pruinosa utriculata variabilis fasciculata (some forms) Natural hybrids floridana, smalliana

Tillandsias that are reluctant to flower in the Tropics by Bob Hudson

Over the years I have purchased plants that looked nice in books but have found they are reluctant to flower for me. Some are the soft green leaf types are not only reluctant to flower but I also find them harder to grow.

We are very lucky that we can grow a wide variety of plants - not all are from the tropics but we can grow them well and also have them flower.

While these do not flower in Cairns, some flower on our Tablelands 'Creation' aeranthos bergeri cacticola deppeana funkiana (grey leaf form) imperialis ixioides kirchhoffiana zecheri multicaulis punctulata tectorum

We can grow the plants that need cooler climates to flower and many growers from outside our area are happy to be able to purchase these plants.

The TPE by its nature is a discussion group. For this reason we have always kept the numbers down by insisting that attending members present a session. This has also helped pick the people that will speak up in such a forum, not blend into the background. After all, we have the Australian Bromeliad Conference for those wanting to go to a presentation and not have to contribute to a discussion – so that forum already exists. The other members of the TPE have always been supportive of the session leader in this forum, as they are all very keen growers. So each time we have had a nervous newer grower, they have soon lost their nervousness as everyone is interested in the topic - tillandsias.

It was suggested we stage this 6th Tillandsia Participation Event at the WBC, and this proposal was approved by the group through its internet chat group – the Till Nuts. Although I have been appointed convener, it is up to the loose coalition of participants to decide how we handle the thing (the TPE). For this reason we have a situation where we have no real guidelines on how to manage the group at the WBC, which will break with the essence of how the group has previously run. That is, we have previously had minimal organization at TPEs – no-one to issue name tags, when swapping or selling plants everyone just does what they want, etc - the venue is there and it is up to everyone (all participants) to help as I want to be part of the discussion.

So this time the discussion group (the inner circle) will be in a horseshoe shape with the leader of the session at the front. The leader will be miked this time – something we've never needed to do. The leader will "have the floor" & may at any time invite comments from another member, or open discussion with the group. Some leaders use their session to lead a discussion, some use it to put a presentation – it is up to them. This situation, from an organizational point of view, will be harder for me to handle this time – making sure that those in the outer circle can hear all of the comments. To insist that the microphone get handed around before all comment is made may bog things down, and we may lose the essence of what makes the situation work. To some degree those in the outer circle may have to wear some of this – though we will be trying to address it.

The outer circle is a rather indefinable thing at the moment. I am unsure of the numbers that will be there, and some organization will have to be made, at least to some degree, on the spot. The outer circle will not be participating in the conversation, but will be looking on. I ask anyone that wants to register to understand this situation. I also ask that registrants arrive on time, and do not come and go during the sessions.

The inner circle will be meeting in the room between 7.30 and 8.30 am. The room will be open to the others in the outer circle at around 8.40 am (ie sometime after 8.30 am). The opening of the TPE will be at 9 am and the sessions commence immediately after. We are there to discuss tillandsias, and do not really have much concern for formalities – but we are a friendly bunch.

We welcome those that would like to attend, but ask those attending for the first time to understand the principles, and realize that it is a no frills Event. The charge to attend will be \$70 per person and this charge includes morning tea, afternoon tea and lunch. Those choosing to attend should contact me by 1st May now.
